THE ECONOMICS OF CRIME

Study of i) economic factors influencing criminal behavior and ii) the impact of crime on economic outcomes.

Historical Perspective: Gary Becker's (1968) "Crime and Punishment" model, which analyzed crime as a rational choice based on cost-benefit analysis.

Key Questions in the Economics of Crime:

- What are the economic incentives and disincentives associated with criminal behavior?
- How do factors like unemployment, education, and inequality influence criminal behavior?
- What are the effects of criminal justice policies on crime?



THE SHIFT TOWARD EMPIRICAL WORK AND CAUSAL IDENTIFICATION

Motivation: Establishing causal relationships is challenging in social sciences, especially in economics and criminology, due to confounding factors.

Challenges: reverse causality, omitted variables, and selection bias that make simple correlations unreliable.

Need for Credible Identification: importance of causality for informing policy, predicting individual behavior, and making effective interventions.

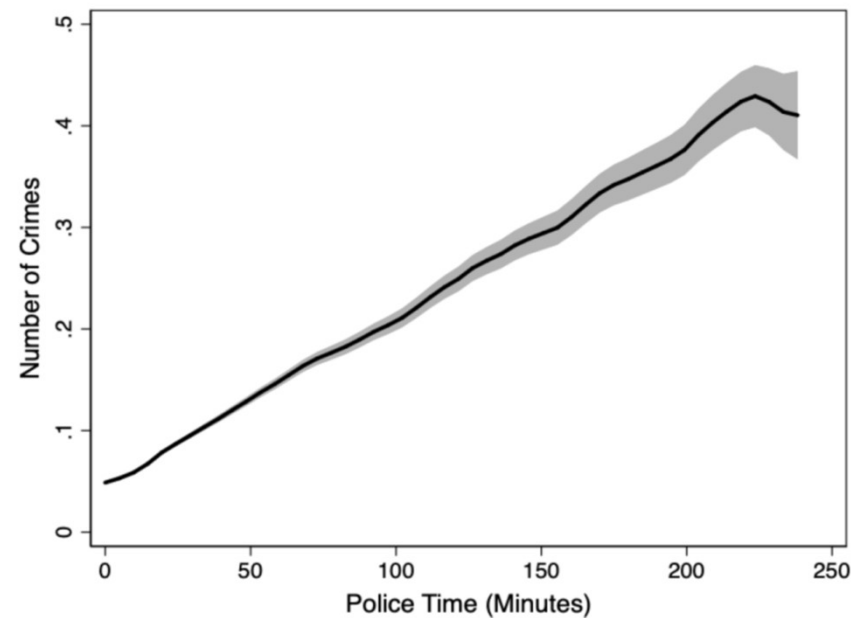
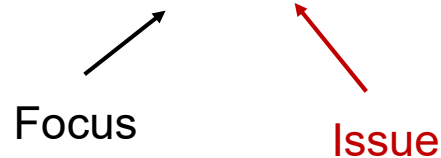
CORRELATION \neq CAUSATION: Police-Crime

Research question: How much should we invest in police (**P**) patrolling? Does an increase in police presence reduce crime (**C**), and by how much?

Data: Essex (UK)

Correlation: based on big data

Reverse causality: $P \rightarrow C \rightarrow P$





CORRELATION \neq CAUSATION: Unemployment-Crime

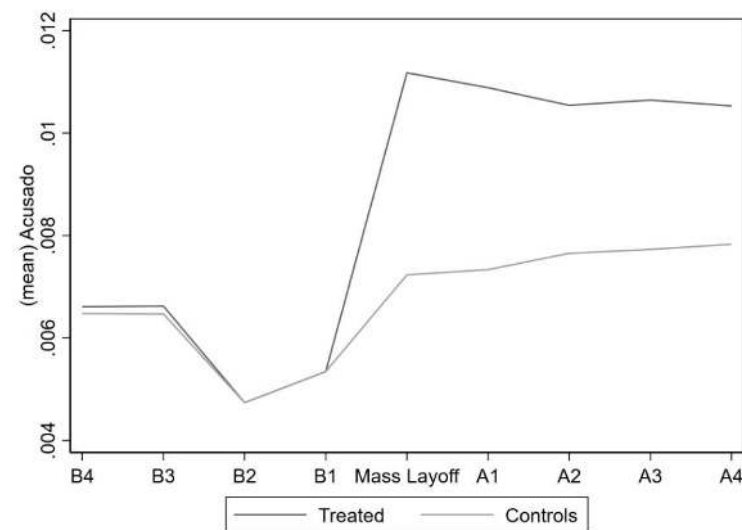
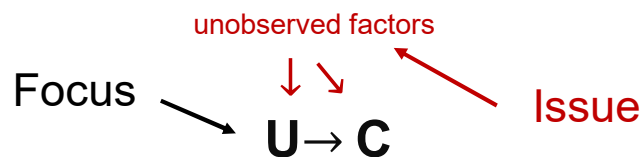
Research question: Does unemployment (**U**) trigger criminal behavior (**C**)?

Recent literature: Use mass layoffs (>30%) to reduce selection

Data: Employer-employee & crime in Chile

Correlation: With job loss $C \uparrow$

Selection and reverse causality:





CORRELATION \neq CAUSATION: Prisons and Crime

Research question: Do prison conditions (open prison) influence criminal behavior?

Data: Italian prison admin.

Correlation: Large difference in recidivism between Bollate inmates and inmates in other prisons

Selection: The prison administration **selects** inmates who end up in **Bollate**.

CORRELATION \neq CAUSATION: Immigrants' Legal Status-Crime

Research question: Does immigrants' legal status reduce criminal behavior?

Data: Italian Prison Admin

Correlation: about 30% of inmates are immigrants and most are undocumented

Selection: but immigrants who acquire legal status may have better labor market prospects, irrespective of their legal status. More educated, more forward-looking, ...

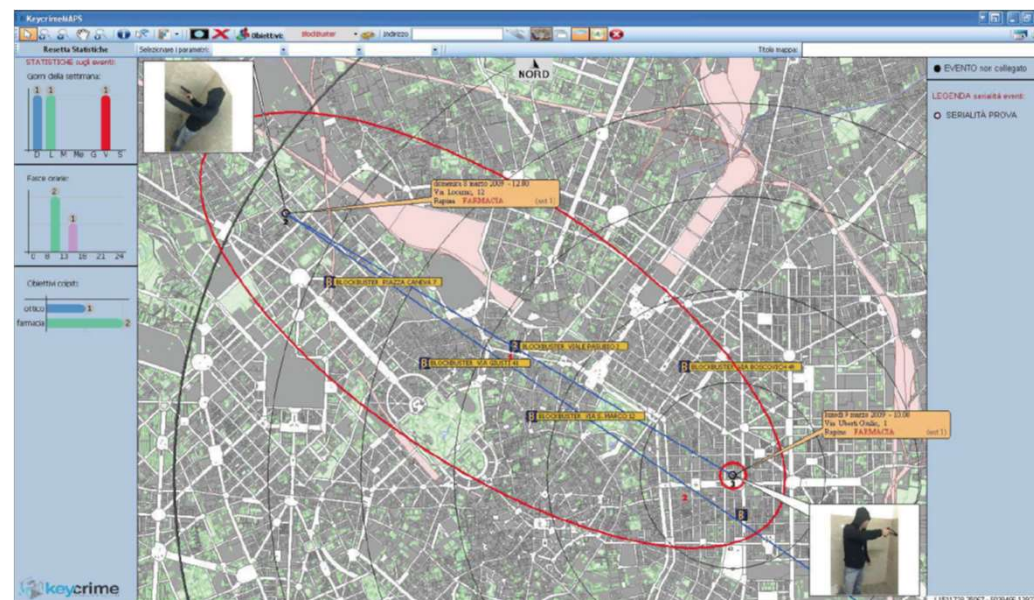
CORRELATION \neq CAUSATION: Predictive Policing & Police Productivity

Research question: Does predictive policing increase clearance rates?

Data: Milan police department

Correlation: Large improvements in clearance rates

Selection: the software may just pick crimes that are easier to predict and thus, easier to clear (leaving the others unsolved)





CORRELATION \neq CAUSATION:

Banking Regulation & Money Laundering

Research question: Does anti-money laundering regulation work?
i.e. transaction value thresholds, reporting activity, etc.

Probable endogenous response: criminals respond to incentives by i) transacting below the limits, ii) increasing the number of transactions to add noise to such transactions, etc.

Correlation: reductions in observed risky transactions following a change in regulation may be due to an endogenous criminal response to circumvent the regulation (**displacement**): could be mistaken for deterrence

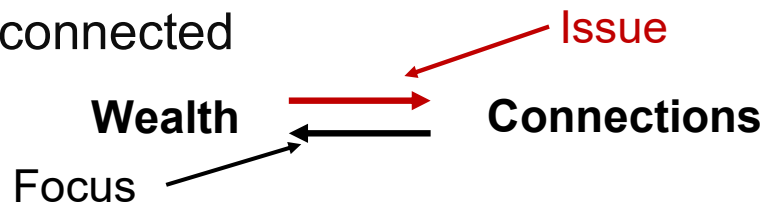
CORRELATION \neq CAUSATION: Mobsters' Network Centrality and Success

Research question: Are mobsters with more Mafia connections more successful?




Correlation: positive correlation between network centrality and wealth

Reverse causality: More wealthy mobsters could use the money to become more powerful, more connected

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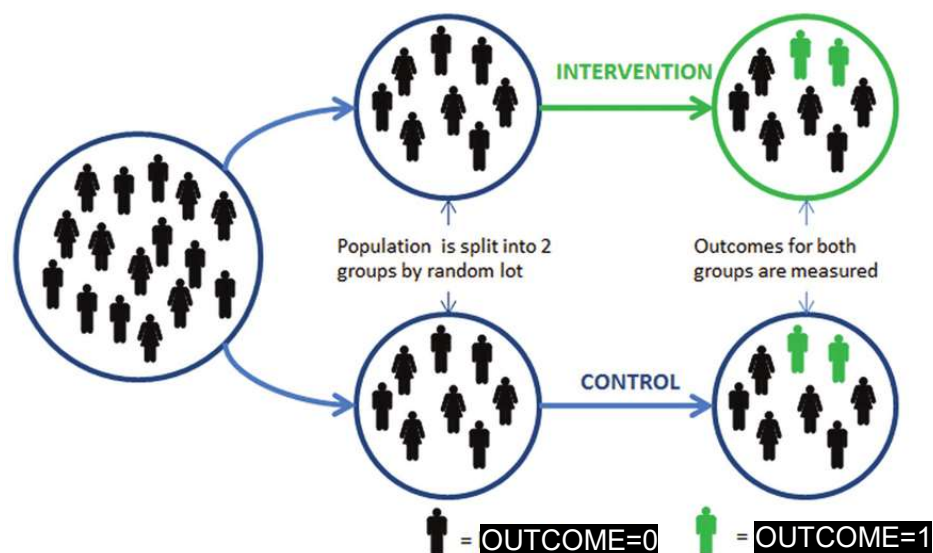
ADVANCEMENTS IN METHODOLOGY

Natural Experiments: Economists have leveraged events or policies that mimic random assignment, like changes in policing practices or legal thresholds.

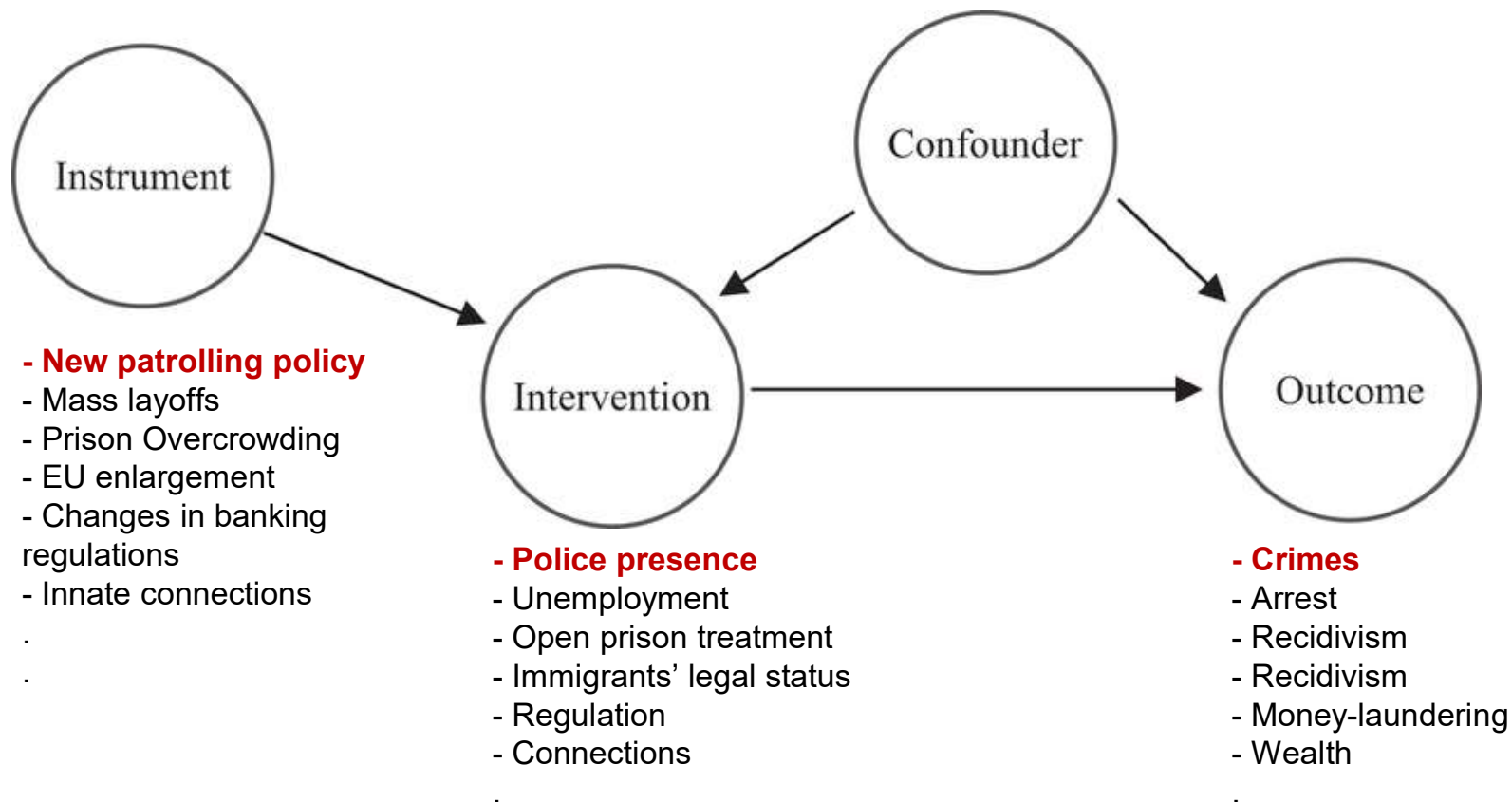

RESULTS POLICE-CRIME

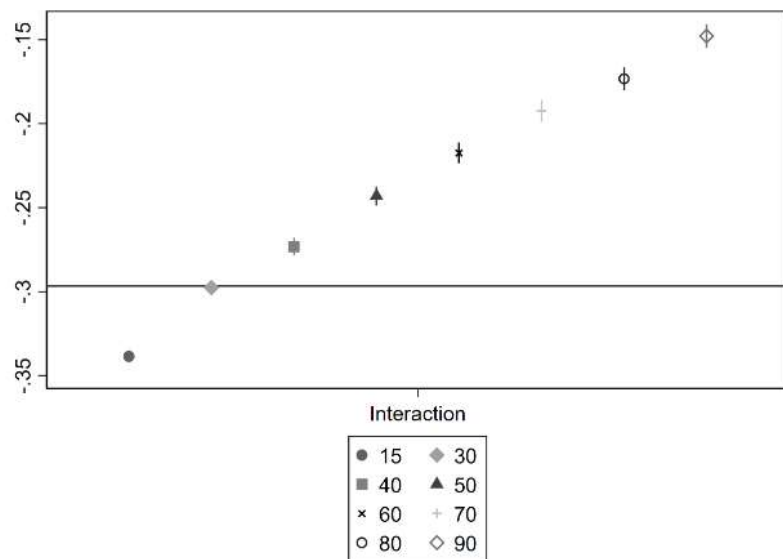
- Mobile police patrols reduce crime, but only for about 45 minutes



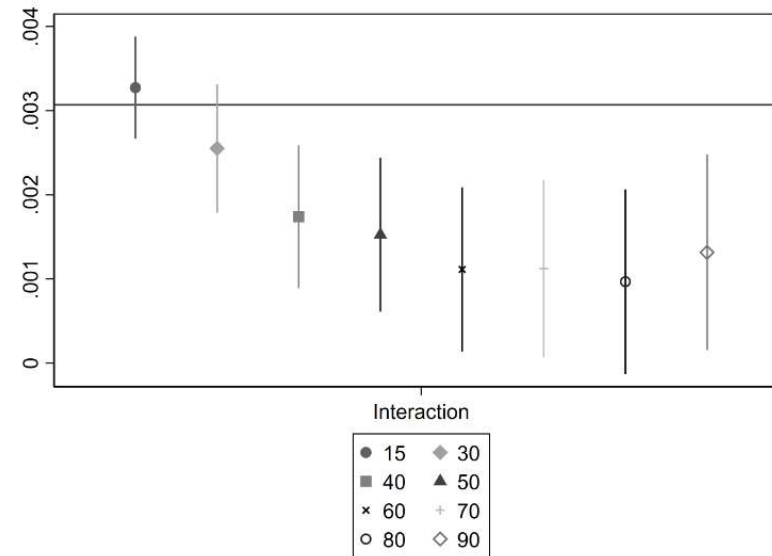
RESULTS MASS-LAYOFF AND CRIME

- Mass-layoffs lead to employment losses and arrests, but the effects are larger the smaller the fractions of laid off workers

Changes in Employment by the Fraction of the Mass Layoff

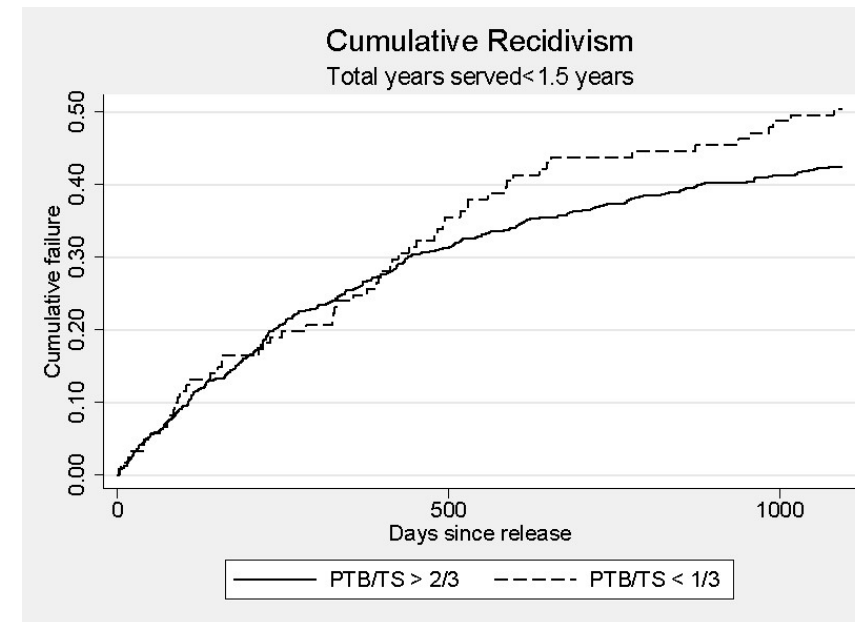
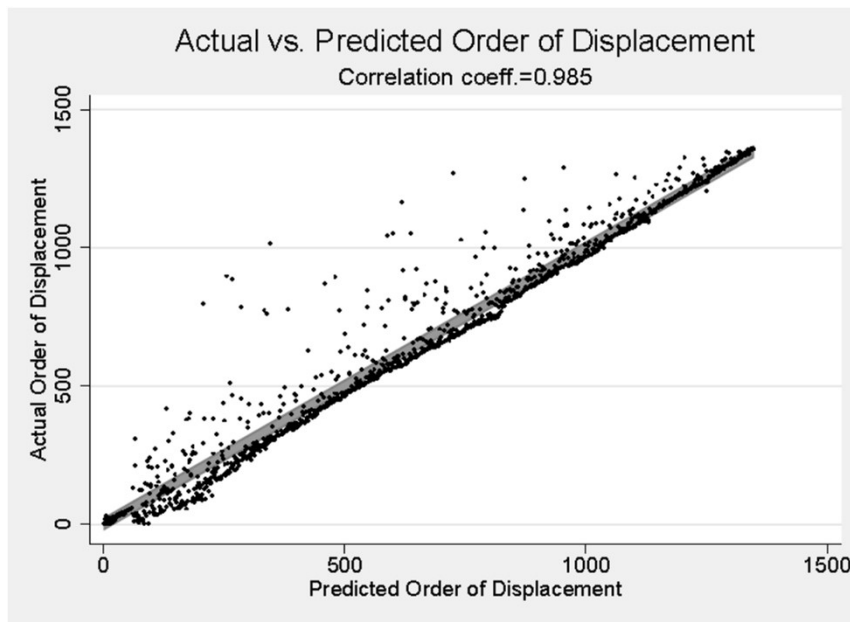


Changes in Arrests by the Fraction of the Mass Layoff



RESULTS PRISON CONDITIONS AND CRIME

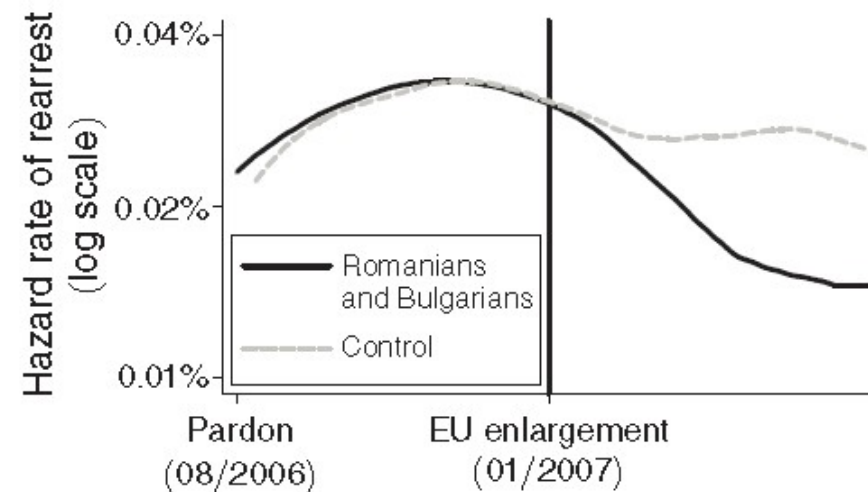
- Open and more humane prison conditions reduce recidivism



RESULTS LEGAL STATUS AND CRIME

- EU-acquired legal status (Romania and Bulgaria) reduces inmates' recidivism

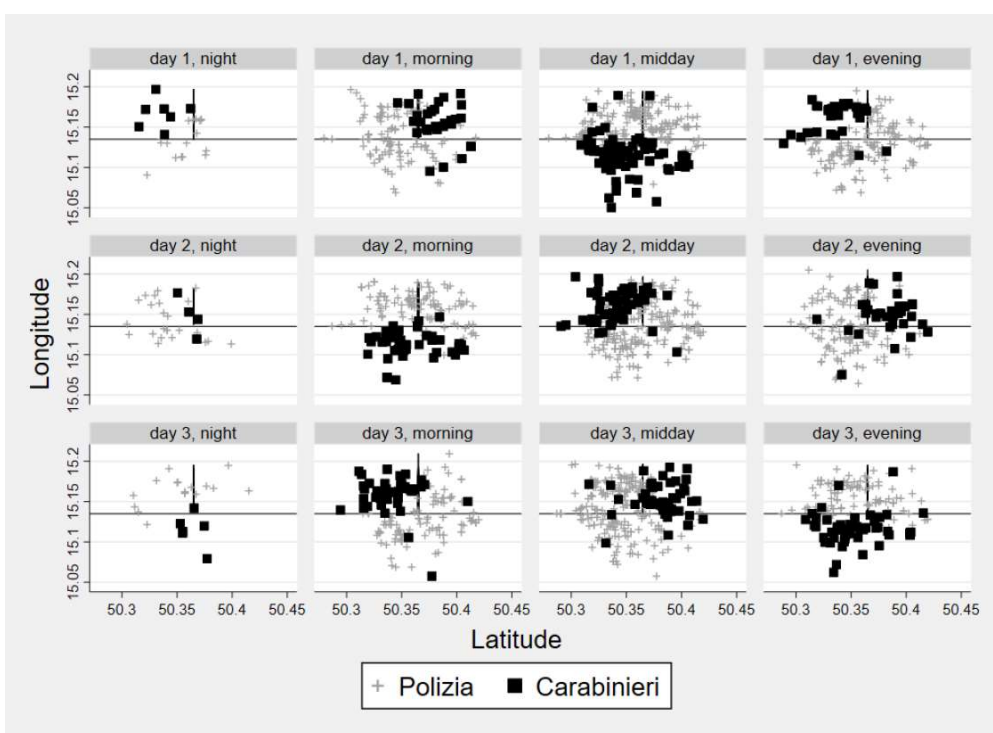
2007 EU Enlargement





RESULTS PREDICTIVE POLICING

- Predictive policing (KeyCrime) increases clearance rates

- Italian-American mobsters with more INNATE CONNECTIONS (informative content of last names) have more housing wealth
